Hello everyone

The highlight of the week for me was the visit yesterday from the Lord Mayor of Bristol - Jos Clark. What made it such a highlight was the pride I felt as children in Years 4, 5 and 6 presented the results of their work during our two-week community focus. Year 6 children created a beautiful ceremony to mark the planting of two trees that will be their legacy to Hannah More. Year 4 and 5 children talked passionately about how their projects improved the school environment. Well done all of you.

Several parents have asked me about the school's approach to relationships education, which is now a compulsory part of the curriculum. We are finalising our lesson plans and will be ready to share them with parents soon. We will not be able to have a large scale meeting following the new restrictions on meeting size, but will find other ways of communicating the information to you and letting people comment and feed back.

Finally, a little reminder about PE kit. Children should wear PE kit to school if they have PE in the morning. They should bring their uniform in a bag to change into at lunchtime. If they have PE in the afternoon they should come to school in uniform with their PE kit in a bag. PE kit should be black, blue or grey leggings, shorts or joggers and a house coloured t-shirt. Children should have trainers or daps to wear on their feet. In colder weather they may wear a grey or navy hoodie over their PE kit.



Update on roadworks

Reception

This week we talked about kindness. We thought about what it means to be kind to someone else and what we do to show kindness. We also listened to different sounds and made shakers which we used to copy a rhythm. We really enjoyed our first week of being in school all day!

This week we continued to look at Rama and Sita and acted out and created conversations between the characters using speech marks. As scientists we conducted an experiment to find out how shadows change and as mathematicians we ordered hundreds numbers. Please read with your child every day and practise the 2, 5, 3 and 4 times tables.

This week Year 5 had a super busy week. As Mathematicians we learnt about numbers up to 100,000 (!), and as writers, we wrote some creepy setting descriptions about an abandoned house. Miss Campbell, Mrs Jackson and Lisa have been thrilled with the amazing effort of the children this week. We also got to show off our fabulous benches to the Lord Mayor. At home please practise words from your spelling list.



This week Year 1 learnt about people who help us. We learnt about the different jobs people have. We even met a builder who told us how he helps people. At home, talk with your child about people who help your family. Practise the tricky words in your homework books. Remember to bring homework back on Mondays and borrowed books on Tuesday!

This week Year 2 delved more deeply into Place Value in our maths lessons. In English, we described the characters and the setting in our class book (The Tin Forest). At home, please read with your child every day. Practise identifying nouns and adjectives by finding them in and around your house (bonus points if you can say WHERE they are by using a preposition).

We got very excited this
week because we learnt that the Romans
came to Bristol! As Mathematicians we
showed so much confidence in our
knowledge of thousands and as Authors we
wrote setting descriptions and diary
entries! Wow! All of Year 4 have worked so
hard this week and their teachers are so,
so proud! Please help at home by reading
with your child and encouraging them to
practise times tables.

This week as Mathematicians we compared and ordered numbers to ten million. We also practised our rounding skills. As authors, we learned to use dialogue and speech punctuation in stories. In our enquiry, we thought about how humans and animals change over time. Please help at home by practising written methods of multiplication and division with your child.



Homework is handed out on Thursdays and should be returned on Mondays. As well as homework, we ask parents to read with their child every day.
