

Reception classes ... It has been an exciting week for Reception. We have been reading about the adventures of 'Supertato' and made our own vegetable superheroes and villain characters We also learnt about keeping healthy and even had a visit from a dentist who showed us how to keep our teeth healthy. In Maths we practised counting by using money to pay in our Healthy Café. At home, can you keep a healthy diary, noting which fruits or vegetables you have eaten and exercise you have done. Can you eat 5 a day? Or more?

- Year 1 ... This week we looked at the story Jack and the Beanstalk. We enjoyed planting our own seeds. In Numeracy we started to multiply and work out different multiplication number sentences. We introduced our new topic and discussed different features around the world (hills, forest, mountains, rivers and islands etc.). At home, can you count forwards and backwards in 2s, 5s and 10s?
- **Year 2**... This week we looked at Non-Fiction texts in Literacy. In maths we practised drawing shapes with lines of symmetry and learned about directional language left, right, turn, up, down. In topic we learned about Shabbat. **At home, please talk about the meaning of clockwise and anticlockwise, left and right**.
- **Year 3** ... This week we started our new maths topic learning all about fractions! In literacy, we thought about our new discussion text. We also really enjoyed our first swimming lesson and can't wait for next week. At home, please talk with your children about fractions of things in the real world!
- **Year 4** ... This week back we multiplied and divided by 10 and 100 using our place value knowledge. In Literacy we found out what our new text will be and have practised debating learning to discuss our opinions in a persuasive way. In topic we learnt about Judaism and the festivals they celebrate! **Please test your child on their spellings (see their homework books for the spellings they should know!)**.
- Year 5... In Literacy we learned about how personification brings objects to life! We planned and wrote our own personification poems using this idea. In Maths, we continued to practise our skills involving decimal numbers such as: comparing if they are greater or less than, reading numbers with up to 3 decimal places and ordering from biggest to smallest. At home, please support your child to write a story in up to 100 words for our Book Week competition!
- Year 6 ... In literacy this week, we explored our new class text: Beetle Boy. We made book predictions using our inference skills and acted out scenes from the book, showing feeling and motive through our actions. We enjoyed our trip to Lifeskills at the Create centre where we learnt about how to stay safe in hazardous situations. We finished the week with an RSPB workshop about birds. What a busy first week back! Please support your child with their homework this week. They have an arithmetic sheet, comprehension and a short writing activity to do.
